is more than just a location on a map. A sense of place is at unique collection of qualities and characteristics-visual, cultural, social, and environmental-that provide meaning to a location. Sense of place is what makes our physical surroundings worth caring about. Distinctiveness involves in ing about. Distinctiveness involves streetscapes, architecture, and historic preservation, but it also involves cultural ents and facilities, restaurants and food, parks, open space and many other factors."

A few months back I wrote about fighting change and how often it is not the change that we oppose, it is the effort that we know it will involve to make the change happen that we fight. Look around at all that McPherson has to offer, and think about the people that had to step up and say, "Hey, we need this, I have an idea and I am willing to help!" Look at your work environment or an organization that you belong to, how many times do you see people sit back because someone already has a plan in place or it's always been done that way? If we don't recognize that new ideas and experiences are beneficial, if we just sit back A few months back I wrote about fighting periences are beneficial, if we just sit back and let things go on as they always have, then eventually we all begin to look the

same. "The more one city comes to look and feel just like every other city, the less reason there is to visit. To foster distinction cities must plan for built environments and settlement patterns that are both uplifting and memorable and that foster a sense of belonging and stewardship by residents. If a building, a landscape or a city is not beautiful, it will not be loved. If it is not loved, it won't be maintained and improved. In short, it won't be sustained."

Wrapping up this tirade, I guess what I am trying to say is that McPherson is industrially diversified, the retail sector is steadily growing and maintaining focus on locally owned unique stores, and we are building owined unique sources, and we are outubing our dining and entertainment choices. We have a long way to go, but I think it is imperative that we look toward a planning process that seeks to engage as many people as possible in community decision making in order to maintain our distinctiveness, adapt to change and enhance the things we should value the most: the people. That being said, we all need to make an effort to attend events, concerts, plays, ball games, shop in the local stores, eat at our local restaurants and utilize the services provided by our neighbors, our community, our friends. As ideas come forth, be it a fountain on the Plaza, flowers in the planters, a dog park, a sales tax ballot issue, restoration of the Community Building, or anything that affects the people, I hope we can all our dining and entertainment choices.
