Inspiring Leaders Since 1981

Leadership McPherson has been a professional development program of the McPherson Chamber since 1981 and is one of the oldest leadership programs in the State of Kansas. The first class graduated in 1982 having completed "4 one-day seminars studying area history, local and state government, area organizations and leadership techniques.

"Fast forward to 2000. The Leadership McPherson Board of Trustees completed extensive training in Servant Leadership and 21st Century Leadership skills and then reorganized the Leadership McPherson Class curriculum. "The goal of the organization is to develop all people by igniting their passions and inspiring service."

In a 10/13/2000 press release from Randy Watson, Leadership Trustee Chair, announcing that nominations are being accepted for the 2001 Leadership McPherson Class Watson said "This will be a special class. Not only will it be the first class of the new century. It will also be the first to experience a new curriculum, the first to make a formal commitment to serve the community, and the first to do a project to improve the lives of children in our area."

Keeping Dollars Local with the McPherson Gift Certificate

The McPherson Gift Certificate (now known as ChamberChecks) was a new program of the McPherson Chamber in 1985. In a March 1990 McPherson Outlook publication, it states they were "specifically designed to provide Christmas gifts, bonuses, and other special recognition to your employees and most importantly, KEEP THOSE \$\$\$'s in McPherson. In the first year, 344 McPherson Gift Certificates were issued." These certificates ultimately had to be brought to the Chamber office by the businesses, to be exchanged for currency. Crazy I know, but it worked at the time.

Thankfully, effective July I, 1990, a "more efficient and time saving gift certificate program was introduced." That was the official start of the ChamberCheck program, which is still widely used today. ChamberChecks are available year-round to anyone wanting to give the perfect gift. They are also easy to order, fun to give, and even more fun to get. (Fun fact, the 1990 ChamberChecks could be redeemed at Brown's Shoe Fit, Dr. Tammy Goering Optometrist, Pizza Hut, Hedlund Electric, Creative Hairlines, Graber's Ace Hardware, YMCA, McPherson Travel Center, The Cook's Nook, Jantz Lumber,

McDonald's, Ask Your Travel Agent, and Wal-Mart along with several iconic businesses who are no longer open.)

A "Shop Local" program of the McPherson Chamber of Commerce since 1985, supporting local businesses and circulating hundreds of thousands of dollars back into our community!

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Communications are Key for Awareness and Involvement

Files of monthly Chamber publications dating back to 1989 provide a thorough picture of the Chamber programs and initiatives for the last 32+ years. These monthly publications were distributed to Chambermembers by direct mail until 2005. The publications were known by various names including the McPherson Outlook, Outlook, Chamber Outlook and then became The Outlook in 2002.

In 2005 The Outlook took on a new format and was a tab or insert in the McPherson Sentinel and distributed to thousands of newspaper subscribers. In a "From the President's Desk" (2005) article by Chet Lang, 2004/2005 Chamber Board President, he said "I feel that it's a great way to reach the public, thus allowing more people to see what the McPherson Chamber of Commerce does for our community. It is also my hope that more people will become aware of these activities and become involved." The Outlook at that time was a multi-page publication and included short write ups from the McPherson Museum, Family Life Center, Main Street, MIDC, McPherson Public Library, McPherson County SBDA, CVB, MCCF, and United Way.

Undergoing another change in appearance and name in 2010, it became known as The Chamber @ Work and was printed in a two-page format as part of the McPherson Sentinel. Since 2015 it has been known as The Chamber Business Journal and continues to include useful chamber and community information.

Not only does the McPherson Chamber create the monthly communications to reach the community members who enjoy catching up with the newspaper, we also send out a weekly Chamber e-newsletter to keep everyone connected to member events and news. "The Most Difficult Volunteer Job There Is"

Independent Sector estimates that 77 million people in the United States volunteer each year, giving some 7 billion hours of their time to help others. That's a stunning number.



There's always been a specific group of volunteers whose commitment so impresses me. Those are the CASA volunteers.

CASA stands for Court Appointed Special Advocates. According to the national website for CASA, the idea came to Seattle juvenile court judge David W. Soukup in 1976. The judge felt he had insufficient information to make a life-changing decision for a 3-year-old girl who had suffered from child abuse. These children, who had experienced abuse or neglect, needed trained volunteers speaking up in the courtroom for their best interests, providing a

McPherson County voice for children. That idea has grown to 948 state and local programs in the United States.

Judges appoint CASA volunteers to represent the best interests of children who have been removed from their homes due to abuse or neglect. The CASA volunteers make sure the child does not get lost in the legal and social service system or languish in a foster home.

To become a CASA requires a lot of training. "So our training is 30 hours,"

said Tara Carlile, Executive Director for CASA of Harvey and McPherson Counties. "Once they're through the training, and they're assigned a case, the commitment is five to 10 hours a month. And generally, that commitment lasts about two years. There's somewhat of a range based on each individual case, the average is a two year commitment." And then CASA volunteers go through 12 additional hours of continuing education each additional year they serve. That adds up to a lot of time.

So why do people volunteer for CASA? Outreach Coordinator Jennifer Ellis

The Ag Committee used to spend a considerable amount of time putting on the When Pigs Fly, a KCBS sanctioned BBQ contest at the McPherson Airport from 2002 to 2014. They also organized the Mac County Roundup 5K from 2014-2019 and participated in the American Legion Family Night for many years. These events were held to raise funds for the McPherson County Agriculture Future of America Scholarship that the Ag Committee awards each year. The McPherson Chamber Agriculture Committee is also a partner in the Ag in the Classroom program for 3rd and 4th graders in McPherson County. A dedicated committee, investing in the youth of our community to cultivate our future ag leaders.

Rural Appreciation Picnic #51

The Rural Appreciation Picnic, organized by the McPherson Chamber of Commerce Agriculture Committee, is back on track for Friday, July 23, 2021. This event is a 51-year tradition to celebrate the completion of harvest and appreciation of our agriculture community.

According to the Kansas Department of Ag report dated 8/2020 "agriculture and agriculture related sectors support 250,058 jobs, or 13% of the entire workforce in the state." And did you know that agriculture is the largest economic and industrial driver in Kansas, generating over \$70 billion into the Kansas economy?

The Rural Appreciation Picnic is sponsored and served by members of the McPherson Chamber of Commerce from 5:30-7:00 pm. On the menu will be freshly grilled hamburgers from Krehbiel's SpecialtyMeats, tasty baked beans from Knackies Meats & Sweets, along with juicy watermelon provided by PrairieLand Partners. said, "The people that are drawn towards this kind of volunteer work are people that see the benefit of helping one child means helping the whole community, when we can change the life of one child and have a ripple effect." So who volunteers to be a CASA? "We've got a retired attorney, a farmer, we've got teachers," said Ellis. "We've got all kinds of people. The common thread there is that they have a heart for this kind of work."

Tara Carlile says you must be at least 21 years of age to be a CASA. She visits with every volunteer prospect to make sure they understand the time commitment and that there's no conflict of interest. An example of a conflict: "Typically, that would be somebody working in the child welfare system that might be knowledgeable about cases prior to being appointed to one," said Carlile. "Before we appoint someone to a case, we make sure that there's a good match, we work with our volunteers to find the right case," said Ellis. "And once they are the case, we still continue to serve as their support system. So we are right there with them, beginning to the end."

Training topics can be "heavy," ranging from domestic violence, to cultural competency, to working with older youth development, and substance abuse issues.

"I call it the most difficult volunteer job there is," said Carlile, "just because you carry the heavy weight of children's stories. But (volunteers) see it as an opportunity to help. We hear stories of child abuse, which is sad, but that gives the volunteers the feeling that they need to help and how can they help and we're just one way to do that."

So far this year, 21 McPherson County children have received support from 8 devoted CASA volunteers.
